February was a busy month for the fine arts scene at Auburn, featuring our fabulous dinner theatre performance of the show *All-Star* on Feb 26-28, phenomenal dancing talent displayed by our students at HRCE "Mascot Showdown" hosted by Auburn Drive, and our hard working Canada Improv Games Improv team making their way to a top 4 national finish in an online Wild Card event. Phew!

On March 20, **Neptune's TourCo** brought a production of Golden/Moose and Hawk to Auburn drive with over 200 students and teachers in attendance. This was a cleverly written and well acted combo play that represented some strong cultural perspectives and voices of African Nova Scotians and Mi'kmaw peoples.

April has the Drama 11/12 class going to visit four of Auburn's feeder schools with an original show that was done three years ago that developed with story and character inspiration from the students of the schools that are being visited. As part of the Drama 11/12 program, they act as a theatre company and devise original shows that suit the audiences they would like to play for with an emphasis on culture, community and creativity.

In May we will be carrying our second production to **Theatre Nova Scotia's** Nova Scotia High School Dramafest at Dalhousie University. The show will be on one of the nights of May 7-9. Fifteen lucky students will be attending workshops at this same festival as they connect with professionals and artists from around the province and the country. The students will be part of a contingent of over 300 students from across the province. May might also be an opportunity for students to learn about creative make-up skills from the College of Makeup Art & Design / Road Show currently making a tour.





Measles prevention in Nova Scotia

We are sharing the following on behalf of Nova Scotia Public Health:

Measles cases are rising in Canada. Measles is a virus that spreads easily and can cause serious complications. **The best way to prevent measles is vaccination.**

Nova Scotia offers free vaccines to eligible people. These can be given by primary care providers, pharmacists and Public Health.

Parents are encouraged to check their family's vaccine records and get the measles vaccine if missing doses. Check your vaccine records at vaxrecordns.nshealth.ca.

Who should get vaccinated?

- Anyone born in or after 1970 should get **two doses** of vaccine, typically given at 12 and 18 months. If missed, children and adults can catch up for free.
- Adults born before 1970 are generally considered immune but can get a single dose if travelling.
- Infants 6-12 months old can get a single dose if travelling but still require two doses after their first birthday to complete the series.
